

The Simplicity Of A Movie Reminds Us Of The Legacy We Can Leave

o you remember the movie Forrest Gump? I never tire of Forrest, his lifetime journey, and the eventual circle to his beginnings. Most folks have seen this movie at least three times. If you are like me, you clutch a pack of tissues and alternate between tears of laughter and sadness. And you probably cry at the same scenes, even though you know what's coming.

One touching scene highlights the universal sentiment of humanity. Forrest



Gump is called home to his dying mother. In their final conversation, Forrest (Tom Hanks), asks his mother Mrs. Gump (Sally Field), "What's my destiny, Mama?" to which she famously replies, "You're gonna have to figure that out for yourself. Life is a box of chocolates, Forrest. You never know what you're gonna get.'

Is it really true that our life path is determined by chance choices? Can we create our own destiny, or is it already determined by our surroundings, luck, and circumstance? What are destiny and its close companion, legacy?

Webster defines a legacy as "something transmitted by or received from an ancestor or predecessor or from the past." It's a talent, a gift, a custom, or a way of life that is delivered from the past to the future. A destiny is a "will of force or a determining cause by which things in general are believed to come to be as they are." It's what will happen.

Perhaps we can determine our destiny by creating a legacy.

For some of us, to find our legacy we look no further than our children. Parents, caregivers, teachers, daycare workers, pediatricians, and other adults who work with children understand that they are glimpsing into the future and that they have some control (albeit limited) as to the outcome. They love children, train them, teach them, and point them in the right direction. They have helped create a new being that will enter the future and carry on.

For others, a legacy is created through some time-honored family tradition. Think about a family-owned restaurant operated by three generations of the same family - a rich work ethic carried from family to family. Or a promise made by a grandfather and carried out by his grandchildren to always have an empty place at the table for a guest or person in need. These actions are carried out for the good of a future recipient.

We help build legacies at the Good Neighbor Community Foundation of Sanibel Captiva when an individual wants to help a nonprofit or a segment of society. An individual can change the future, even after death, by establishing an endowed fund. Legacy gifts, generally defined as gifts through your will or estate, can be used to establish the fund for perpetuity. And he or she can create a legacy for their own family; future generations can contribute to the fund and grow it to meet community needs. The fund can be earmarked for a specific nonprofit, a general area of need in the community, or left to be used where most needed in Southwest Florida.

Creating your own legacy begins by thinking about important moments in your life. Military service, a difficult childhood, witnessing injustice, caring for a disabled sibling, living with a drugaddicted family member, and other life experiences shape our perspectives of how we want to change the future for the better. Conversations with family, clergy. professional advisors, or close friends can also help define a future legacy. Of course, you can always reflect on Mrs.

Gump's wise advice to Forrest: "I happen to believe you make your own destiny. You have to do the best with what God gave you.'

The destiny of your community is determined by the legacy you leave to others.



Miss Florida Climbs Sanibel Lighthouse For Cancer Research

iss Florida, 26-year-old Megan Clementi, climbed the 135 steps of Sanibel's historic lighthouse on Tuesday and scratched one more lighthouse off the 30 she plans to visit and climb before her reign ends July 10.

Clementi's Climb for the Cure, which she created, is to scale all the climbable lighthouses in the state, a total of 30, to raise money for breast cancer research for the Susan G. Komen fund. She began her challenge in January and is closing in on her goal.

"I thought it would bring new attention to the cause and to highlight the need to restore our Florida lighthouses," she added.

After Sanibel, Clementi went on to Port Boca Grande and Gasparilla Island lighthouses. The previous day she had climbed Hillsboro and Cape Florida lights.

With her on Sanibel was John Kennedy, treasurer of the Florida Lighthouse Association.

"Quite a few lighthouses are not climbable," he said. "Cape Canaveral is under construction until August," he added. There are also reef lights that aren't physically climbable.

"I wish I could spend more time in each city," said Clementi. I have made so many contacts. Her personal favorite was the Old St. Joe Lighthouse "because a

person actually lives in it and he showed us around."

Upon her graduation from Jupiter High School, Clementi auditioned for Tokyo Disneyland's only dance show, Once upon a Mouse. Before she knew it, she moved halfway around the world to perform for seven months.

In the fall of 2004, she became an

Orlando Magic dancer and was named captain for 2006-09 and was a game emcee during the past two seasons.

Clementi attended the University of Central Florida where she received her bachelor's degree in electrical engineering and minored in engineering leadership.



Email Friends Keep Eyes On Okeechobee

't is good to have friends and allies; it is good to know we are not alone.

That thought has come to me often lately, especially in my role with the Committee of the Islands. So many people here pitch in to help protect our

sanctuary island. That has been borne out most recently in our efforts to help prevent the brutally polluting effects of Lake Okeechobee water releases on our bay and estuarine habitat. The island press has bloomed with articles about the efforts of city council and various groups and individuals committed to this task.

I was reminded of all this again on June 16 as I sat at my desk reading the latest "conversation" among my Lake O community of email friends. This is a group of people who have been sharing emailed information, concerns, and ideas about the Lake O water releases for

I had just learned that one among us lost a son to a car accident the previous weekend, and I was struck by the enduring nature of the relationship that we

We all felt it, as if the victim were a member of our neighborhood, although almost none of us has ever met the young man. We felt the pain of our colleague who suffered that horrible loss, the loss of a child.

This email community began in 2005, when the waters around those of us to the east and west of Lake Okeechobee were suffering from nasty algae blooms that were caused by massive releases of Lake O water in 2004 and 2005. Oyster and sea grass beds, scallops and fish were dying. Some water managers hoped we would never bond; they hoped instead to pit the east against the west, and vice

Instead, we united. "We" are the community leaders, some local officials, activists and environmentalists who have a common need to be informed about everything having to do with the causes of the polluting releases. We watch Lake O like hawks. We crave information. We provide it to each other, via an ongoing email group that refuses to die. We want to save our estuaries, east and west. We want to send the Lake water to the thirsty Everglades instead.

And in addition to sharing information, we converse about it – every time someone hits the "reply all" button and offers his or her two-cents. That happens often. We learn a lot from each other. Sometimes our "conversations" become slightly heated, because we care.

There are about four dozen of us. We are the kind of people who don't mind reading 33-page reports and hundreds

of news articles that relate to the vexing problem we share.

Send the Water South

In the west, we are empathizing with those who are now seeing toxic bluegreen algae re-appear in the St. Lucie River to the east of the lake. Today, as I write, we are starting to see that bluegreen algae coming out of the lock at Moore Haven, into the Caloosahatchee, flowing westward. We all push together for ways to send the water south - all of which seem to be taking way too long.

In the beginning of our community, there were two email lists - I created one on the west, and Ted Guy created one on the east. Ted and I had slightly different methods for searching for and presenting news articles, commentaries and other information of interest to our groups. My initial main goal was to educate and inform local officials, who prior to 2004 did not seem to be very aware of the way the broken water management system worked. We had been, after all, through years of drought when the problems weren't so apparent.

In the early days, Ted's group was more focused on activists who were mad as heck, and ready to file a lawsuit. Our groups overlapped – there were east coasters in my group who were also in Ted's, and west coasters in Ted's group who were also in mine.

By sometime in 2008, it was clear to me that my goal had been achieved. Local officials were now all painfully aware of the problem and its causes. There was no need for me to duplicate Ted's efforts any longer. The die-hards among us remained in Ted's email group, and I put my Lake O email list of about 50 addresses to rest. The two email groups merged.

Four Years After Charley

I sent a last email to my group on August 14, 2008 - on the fourth anniversary of the day after Hurricane Charley. Upon hearing that I was ending my email news service, Commissioner Bob Janes wrote, "You have performed an excellent service to us all." A former Clinton White House official wrote, "Your news clipping service has been such a gift. Thanks for doing this for so long." Members of the board of the Committee of the Islands wrote to thank me for the service as well.

Sanibel Natural Resources Director Rob Loflin wrote, "Thanks for the info over the last several years! Your emails were often the first I'd heard of a particu-

lar development and very useful in planning strategy and pushing buttons." A former Sanibel mayor wrote, "You have no idea how extraordinarily useful your clipping service has been. It has served many people working on this issue from many different perspectives; and I know that our jobs would have been much harder without your combing the press. Those of us already occupied more hours than there are in a day really benefited from your service!!

I gave instructions to my former list members on how to set up Google and Yahoo news alerts to take the place of my service. But Ted's group continues on. We owe a debt of gratitude to Ted Guy for continuing the email news service for the die-hards.

We've been together in cyberspace for years now, and we show no signs of fading away, just as the perplexing problem of Lake O water going the wrong ways shows no sign of letting up soon. We are scattered across the state, from east to west, and we remain in touch - almost daily. Sometimes some of us see some of the others in the flesh, for example at meetings of the South Florida Water Management District's various committees. But mostly we talk via email.


Who are we? We include scientists, leaders of environmental groups, marina owners, lawyers, former elected officials, magazine publishers, boat captains, community activists, realtors, and many more. We are information-hungry people who love our south Florida environment, and we won't give up.

If you are interested in joining a similar news service, try Eco-voice.org, a public service to facilitate the flow of information about environmental issues and events in South Florida.

So we, here on Sanibel, in the city government, on the Committee of the Islands, on the other fine groups that seek to protect our environment, have friends and allies across the state advancing our ideas, our causes.

We are not alone.

few weeks back we had Suzanne Specht, assistant director at The FGCU Small Business Development Center (SBDC) speak to us about programming of providing counseling, low-cost seminars, workshops, and on-line training for those that would like to start or educate themselves about starting and succeeding at running a small business. As sort of a companion speaker, this week we had the director of Girls Going Places of Southwest Florida, Lynne Tarman, and Stefanie Ink from Alliance Financial Group, Fort Myers speak about a program that supports, encourages, and educates young women ages 12 to 18 about entrepreneurship and financial independence. The program in Fort Myers was a pilot program, which has since gone national. This particular program is directed to female students and helping them realizes their dreams of business ownership and entrepreneurial

Each year Girls Going Places focuses in on two important areas of encouragement. First, they award cash scholarships of approximately \$30,000 to three top winners and 12 finalists in the Girls Going Places Entrepreneurship Award contest. This contest is designed to encourage young women that have already shown entrepreneurial spirit (ages

12 to 18) and have already become involved in successfully demonstrating that drive to make their imprint on society. The three top winners last year were: Jessica Cervantes, 18, Miami, Florida, for creating an innovative new generation of children's treats, Popsy Cakes; Christina Johnson, 18, Bronx, New York, founder of Homestyle Caterers, co-founder of Hamilton Art Gallery and the non-forprofit organization

Bring it On to promote youth leadership and community involvement; and Carly Houlahan, 14, Devon, Pennsylvania, who co-founded the nonprofit, Hives For Lives, with her sister producing honey and other hive derived products. Within five years they have donated over \$125,000 to cancer hospitals and research centers to help find a cure for

The second focus has a particular local application. Alliance Financial Group, Florida Gulf Coast University and The Small Business Development Center have just sponsored a Girls Going Places Entrepreneurship Conference at FGCU. In their letter to prospective sponsors it

states, "The event joins approximately 140 female students from middle school and high schools form the Lee, Charlotte, Hendry and Collier counties along with local women business owners, career executives and entrepreneurs for activities and discussions that introduce entrepreneurship and business ownership. School administrators select girls that they feel would most likely benefit from the information and the experience. The best conferences involve a diverse audience of girls; hence, the program is not limited to high academic achievers. The Girls Going Places conference is a day-long workshop designed to mentor and educate young women ages 12 to 18 about entrepreneurship and financial independence, and give local women in business a platform to mentor and inspire future female entre-

According to Tarman the Girls Going Places conference is a high-energy fun day that is designed to focus on the skills and discipline necessary to have a successful financial future whether in business or in life. The girls take part in a number of fun exercises that demonstrate the trials and tribulations of becoming financially responsible for their business successes.

A game has been designed for the program, titled Hot Company, somewhat fashioned after Monopoly and LIFE, with pitfalls and challenges of running a real business entity; finding challenging and thought-provoking solutions. There is a Product in a Box challenge. Teams have one hour to design a product from the content of their box, make a business plan and develop a marketing and sales strategy. The girls also experience an extremely meaningful meet and greet session with women business owners in our community. This allows the girls to ask questions of these successful women and involves the mentors in sharing knowledge and encouragement to these young

Gopher Tortoise

ome patients stay at CROW for an extraordinarily long period of time. Patient #08892, a gopher tortoise from Cape Coral, arrived on April 1, 2008 and was just released this summer on

June 17, 2010. That's 808 days in residence.

"She's a long timer, and she's a success story," said Dr. Amber McNamara.

The tortoise, presumably hit by a car, came to the clinic in woeful shape. She had a "punched in" fracture over her hip with a blood clot, and fractures on her upper carapace.

"She did not want to move at all, which was pretty understandable," said Dr. Amber. "She had substantial deficits in both legs."

Staff provided her with two types of pain medication as well as antibiotics, and swabbed her wounds with saline dressing. Dr. Amber jumped in with an acupuncture treatment on Day 2 to try to jump start the flow of energy through her legs.

The gopher tortoise survived the first week, and over the next two months her wounds and fractures healed over. She received a total of four acupuncture treatments in April.

"Compared to what we did when I started here as a student, we have found that employing acupuncture gets them started on a path to recovery more quickly," said Dr. Amber.

In addition, they placed her on a physical rehab program consisting of range of motion exercises, acupressure, and walking on grass, gravel and up the ramp to the Roberts Cage.

Through the summer and autumn of 2008 the tortoise continued to gain

strength in her legs and head toward full recovery. But in January of 2009 something happened.

"She became really dull, with discharge from her nose, edema and increased respiratory effort," said Dr. Amber. "She looked awful, we really thought we would lose her. She had wounds on her elbows, so she may have been bitten by fire ants. We still don't know what happened to her."

CROW staff went back to the drawing board with antibiotics, acupuncture, and anti-inflammatories. But it took a full six months to come out of this depressed condition. "It was a real trough in her recovery," said Dr. Amber.

In July she exhibited a brighter demeanor, and work on her locomotion resumed.

"Thankfully we have a lot of volunteers to graze the tortoises," said Dr. Amber. "Nancy Green and Pat Appino, in particular, spent a lot of time with this patient. The volunteers can take a lot of credit for her success."

CROW kept her during last winter to make sure she was strong enough for release, and returned her to the wild on June 17.

CROW (Clinic for the Rehabilitation of Wildlife, Inc.) is a non-profit wildlife hospital providing veterinary care for native and migratory wildlife from the Gulf Coast of Florida. 





New Education Ranger At Wildlife Refuge

ecky Wolff arrived at J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge on June 2 to take the position of environmental education specialist vacated by Toni Westland when she was promoted to supervisory refuge ranger in September 2009.

Wolff comes here from Cherokee, Oklahoma, where she served as the outdoor recreation planner at Salt Plains National Wildlife Refuge.

'I was in charge of their visitor services division and was involved in several partnerships with other wildlife refuges, state



parks, and the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation," said Wolff, a graduate from Ohio State University in animal sciences and history education and a confirmed Buckeyes fan.

She did her internship at Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge in Virginia, followed by a two-year term position there.

Born and raised in Streetsboro, Ohio, Wolff's appreciation and education of nature began early in life.

"I was raised to love the outdoors and appreciate nature's blessings," she says. "My pappy – my grandfather -- always told me 'unless you love walls, never work behind them' - a statement that I took to

heart. Now my classroom is nature and I'm the interpreter."

Wolff's love of birding and aspirations to become a lead environmental educator eventually brought her to Sanibel.

"I'm a birder at heart, so it is so amazing driving to work every morning and seeing osprey, frigate birds, pelicans, and the terns," said Wolff. "Oh, the birding is amazing! I just love learning about this place.'

Getting acquainted with a new ecosystem and the local science teachers are the biggest challenges facing her at this point. She's happy to be leading a summer program, and once she gets into the swing of things plans to "try out new things and ideas... add some 'Becky Flair' to things," she said. "I have a lot of goals that I want to do here at 'Ding.' My main goal is to be worthy of the honor of working at such an amazing refuge.

The environmental education program at "Ding" Darling is funded in part by "Ding" Darling Wildlife Society-Friends of the Refuge, a non-profit organization that supports the Education Center, "Ding" Darling Days, and other educational and research programs at the refuge.

Florida Fiddlewood

Plorida fiddlewood (Citharexylum fruticosum) gets its catchy common name because the strong wood supposedly is desirable in constructing stringed musical instruments.

Plant experts disagree, however, on whether the plant was actually harvested for such a use.

In any case, this native tree's value as a low-maintenance landscape plant, butterfly attractor, and food source for wildlife argue against cutting it down for that purpose.

In coastal pinelands, Florida fiddlewood usually grows to only shrub size, but in hammocks it might reach over 30 feet in height.

This tree with dense evergreen foliage is usually multibranched, although it sometimes develops as a single-trunked specimen. The shiny green spatulate leaves are five to six inches long with notched or pointed tips.

The tiny white tubular flowers are fivelobed and fragrant. Both flowers and later the fruit cluster at the leaf axils.

Flowers appear intermittently throughout the year and attract butterflies. The delicious honey that bees produce from the flowers makes the plant a friend to both beekeepers and humans. The fleshy globular fruit of only one-

The fleshy globular fruit of only onehalf inch in diameter is edible and sweet but not palatable for humans. However, the fruit is a desirable food source for birds and other wildlife.

One of fiddlewood's most outstanding ornamental features is the fruit's color transformation – from unripe shiny orange, reds, or bronze shades to a ripened glistening purple-black. Orange or pinkish leaf stems and major veins also add color.

Florida fiddlewood is highly droughtand salt-tolerant once established, and it's pest-resistant too.

Plant it in sun to partial shade. Use it as a screening plant, hedge, or shade tree. Pruning for shape is optional.

Propagate fiddlewood with seeds or simply let the mother plant self-sow.

Artreach Project Show At BIG ARTS



One Step Forward, Two Steps Back

ecent media coverage has drawn attention to the fact that bacteria are capable of consuming crude oil – so, you might ask, why don't we release massive

quantities of it into the gulf for a feast of monumental proportions?

It is indeed true that bacteria will consume the massive amount of oil that is pouring into the Gulf of Mexico. Because the waters of the Gulf of Mexico are very warm, they will do so very efficiently. The rate of bacterial degradation is much more rapid in warm water than in colder, more northern waters. One step forward - but it's not that simple.

After a closer look at bacterial degradation and its ramifications, we end up taking two steps back.

When large amounts of organic matter are present in the ocean, bacterial populations that consume that organic matter grow rapidly and reach very high population densities.

Like fish, mollusks, copepods, and crustaceans, these marine bacteria breathe dissolved oxygen from water, which is a healthy part of ocean chemistry at normal levels. The problem occurs when bacteria reach such high population densities that they extract all (or at least most) of the dissolved oxygen in the water they occupy. Such areas of oxygen-depleted water are known as hypoxic zones. Hypoxic zones kill other creatures that need oxygen to survive: the fish, copepods, crustaceans and mollusks that now unsuccessfully compete with the bacterial populations for oxygen. Hypoxic zones are known as dead zones, which are areas with no living organisms. The bacterial breakdown of the massive amounts of oil will create huge dead zones in the waters of the Gulf of Mexico. Take one step back.

Nitrogen, a crucial marine nutrient, makes up between 0.1-2.0% of many gulf crude oils by weight. When bacteria break down and consume crude oil, they release nitrogen from the oil into the surrounding water, where microscopic plant cells called phytoplankton rapidly take it up. Phytoplankton densities are normally limited by a scarcity of nitrogen in the ocean, but when large amounts of nitrogen are available to phytoplankton, their populations increase very rapidly. These rapid population explosions are known as phytoplankton blooms. Some phytoplankton blooms produce toxins that kill marine animals and cause significant human health impacts. These are especially common in the Gulf of Mexico during the summer and fall months. Take a second step back.

To make matters worse, when a phytoplankton bloom eventually dies, the individual cells sink and are consumed by bacterial populations. This bacterial

decomposition consumes oxygen and causes more dead zones, which brings us back to step one. The dead zones kill marine life and the bacteria release – you guessed it - nitrogen; which of course, will be taken up by phytoplankton. Do you see the pattern emerging here?

So, if you hear the good news that bacteria will take care of cleaning up the oil spill, don't be lulled into complacency by believing that all is fine and dandy. Realize that the impacts of this event can cascade through our oceans long after the last beaches and birds are cleaned and the cameras have moved on to another story.

Mixed Bag Flats Fishing

arpon last week could be found anywhere from Fort Myers Beach all the way up to Gasparilla Island. The largest concentrations of fish I found were gulf-

side. However, three to four hours after sunrise, the bite was over.

Tarpon south of Redfish Pass fed better on live threadfins either freelined or fished under a float. The schools of tarpon north of the pass were hungrier for small crabs, either pass crabs or blue crabs. The few tarpon \overline{I} found in the bay were from Cabbage Key to Foster's Point on North Captiva and not responsive to any baits pitched right in front of them. I did see a few hook-ups in the bay but the gulfside fish just seemed to be more cooperative.

Redfish fishing on the higher tides was

a good bet. As long as the tide was high and moving, they fed well. Mangrove shorelines on Cayo Costa and North Captiva were productive on both cut and live baits pitched deep under the trees. Redfish fishing has been getting better and better every week with lots over the slot now in the mix. Closer to home, around the southern sound, there were a few reds but not in the larger numbers found in the middle to northern sound.

One of my favorite trout spots over the last month has been the western side of the power lines. It seems no matter what the tide, if you find three to four feet of water you can catch keeper size trout. This area is mostly grass with sand potholes and then drops into deeper water close to the intercoastal. Small pinfish and shiners drifted under a popping cork caught limits of trout just about any

When the tide is in a lower phase I like to fish closer to the no-wake buoy line or nearer the intercoastal where the water is a little deeper. On a higher tide get right on top of the flat and throw into the white visible sandholes. On light wind days, drift fish this area, while on stronger wind days, anchor up. When anchored simply lift the anchor if the fish are not biting and drift another 20 yards or so

before re-anchoring. This method lets you cover almost as much water as drifting until you locate the fish.

First thing in a morning or during low light conditions, top water plugs also work great here. A skitterwalk or a chug bug will get smashed on the surface. As the sun gets up higher a subsurface mirrordine will do the trick. If there is a lot of floating grass, try a weedless soft plastic bait. Pretty much anything that is the same size and colors as a greenback shiner will get hit as that's the pattern the fish are on.

If you are looking for mixed bag action, any deeper grass flat in the sound is worth fishing right now. I look for feeding birds, either pelicans, gulls or cormorants in four to eight feet of water. A good area to get started is anywhere from Chino Island north to Demiere Key on the outside of the north south sandbar. Anchor up and pitch a few handfuls of live shiners out every five to 10 minutes and watch for fish to break the surface. I like to cast with the shiners rigged freeline and simply jig them back in slowly just like you're fishing a jig. This method keeps them from ending up in the grass and the rising and falling of the shiner will trigger the bite.

The variety of fish out on the flats right now is awesome. Expect to catch trout, ladyfish, bluefish, Spanish mackerel, blacktips and jacks. Keep a ladyfish or too because it won't take long until

one of these fish you're bringing in to the boat gets cut in two by a bigger shark. Once this happens cast out a half a ladyfish and hold on. Any kind of activity quickly will bring in the sharks.

Now we are in the summer time pattern of hot and humid conditions strong afternoon thunderstorms become an almost daily event. Early out and early in become the best way you can avoid the sizzling heat and generally the quick moving bad weather. These dangerous thunder storms often pack strong winds and lots of lightning. Keep your eyes open for building storms; they can be a scary thing when out on the water and should be respected.

Black Pelicans

t was spring in Florida and I was as much a part of the spring day as the roseate spoonbills flying overhead and the hot pink periwinkles covering the ground and the

pale pink coquina shells burying themselves beneath the sand. I was shy too, like those coquina shells." – excerpt from the book *Portion*

of the Sea

When my boys were little, we would sit by the shore at the Lighthouse Beach and I would teach them their colors by way of the coquina shells. Each time one of the tiny shells surfaced in the sand, my boys had to call out its color before it slipped back under. My son asked why the little shells disappear so quickly and I remember telling him they are shy, and we went on to discuss shyness. I went home that morning and added to the first line of the novel I was writing: I was shy too, like those coquina shells.

I get an abundance of inspiration while wading in the Gulf of Mexico with my children or watching sunsets with my family. It's why all three of my novels take place here on Sanibel where I live. Recently, my husband and I went for a weekend to New York City and I wondered whether fresh ideas might come to me while in the city. But looking up at those skyscrapers when the tallest structure I'm used to seeing is Sanibel's Lighthouse, and gazing into those store windows at the colorful designer handbags when the most colorful objects I notice back home are seashells, I told my husband, "I'm not getting ideas for writing, but maybe I could get a new purse and some clothes instead.

But then I passed a kiosk of a major New York newspaper and its enormously bold headline reached out and grabbed me: Welcome to Florida! The doom and gloom of that headline, related to the oil spill, stopped me in my tracks. I had been with my children at our beach a few days ago playing waist-high in the water and there was no oil. The headline made it look as if all of Florida was seeing oil, and if you visit, oil is what you get.

The truth is, most of Florida has not seen oil and it is my hope that we never will. In the wake of this oil tragedy, I appreciate life and nature like never before while at the same time deeply mourn and feel angry for what is happening in the waters where the oil has reached – the loss of life right on down to the mollusks living unseen and unheard within the intricate interior kingdoms of the seashells.

Since the spill, it is my son who keeps inquiring about the wellbeing of these slimy little beings because he has a heart for all creatures great and small. Last summer he spotted someone taking a live shell from the water. I stood watching, ready to count how many live ones she planned to take, but my son put an end to it after the first, walking up to the lady, telling her it was wrong, taking a live shell from the water. I told my boy he was a hero for having spoken out, and for having saved if even a single, miniscule form of life. There is as much to learn from a child as there is from the sea.

Back in New York we took a nar-

rated bus tour of the city, but with those Welcome to Florida headlines on every corner, all I could think of was the oil. And when people heard we were Floridians, they gave us condolences, asked whether they should cancel travel plans, and one asked whether we had seen black pelicans. "No," I told them. "Our coastline remains unspoiled. There is no oil where we live." And the last time I noticed, the roseate spoonbills, periwinkles and coquina shells were all still pink!

As the bus passed by the New York Public Library, the narrator pointed out two marble lions guarding the entrance and told us the lions were named

Patience and Fortitude at a difficult time in New York's history when those virtues were needed the most. Of course I scribbled this all down and my husband asked, "Getting ideas for a book, dear?" No, darling, but it had me thinking if there were lions (or maybe sea lions) standing guard on the causeway bridge, what would we name them? Truth and Hope came to mind but I'm sure everyone has their own thoughts as to what Sanibel needs most at this time.







r. Dave Hepburn, who writes a weekly column, Dr. Dave for the Island Sun and The River Weekly, has recently published a book the Doctor Is In (sane)." He subtitles it Indispensable Advice from Dr. Dave and bases the chapters on his medical practice and advice which is generously laced with humor.

Hepburn first relates something bizarre, hilarious, outrageous and then "BAM" now that I have your attention, here is my diagnosis and my advice; a "carrot and stick" approach to medical practice, e.g. speak with levity but carry a big tongue depresser. And it works, you remember the vignettes he relates with more clarity than listlessly turning the pages of a medical manual filled with scientific terms and ailments.

Although Dr. Dave does not subscribe to the theory that "laughter is the best medicine," this book will at least lighten your mood and alleviate your anxiety until your condition improves. The index gives a ready reference allowing you to browse through your particular medical interests without searching through the entire book.


The chapters are short and succinct, as is his weekly column in the newspapers. In the introduction he admits to a wanderlust which has often taken him out of the confines of his office and into the wider less developed world to treat

In his chapter Kicking Death in the Head Hepburn deplores the "supersized sedentary society" which has led to obesity. He prescribes a dog and "...ten thousand steps every day" in addition to an exercise program, sitting less than 7.5 hours per day and using a waist-hip ratio as a predictor of having "the Big Mac Attack."

We are reminded that average life expectancy in 1900 was 48 years and now is 76 in America (80 in Japan) with projections anticipating 125 for later generations. And Hepburn continues his speculation on longevity with his light-hearted mix of sage advice, ending with a quote from a Dr. Ivan Popov, "Wouldn't it be great if we all died young... late in life." We are warned, "...the big three risk factors for cardiac disease are smoking, high blood pressure, and high cholesterol.

A special chapter, On the Wild Side, compares how personality and attitude can affect mental outlook but also physical well-being. He quotes a psychiatrist, ...personality style only becomes a disorder when it is taken to the extreme. Then it begins to interfere with day-to-day functioning.

Hepburn's cover photo shows him to be a handsome man; his patients have no doubt noted his resemblance to actor George Clooney, and he often slyly refers to the famous movie star; writing "... if you have any doubt about a lump or bump, be sure to have it checked out by a professional such as George Clooney.



Onward To Denver In Year Two Of Congress Baseball Adventure

The first week of Chapter Two in our journey to visit every Major League ball park is complete – Sanibel to Denver with stops along the way in Birmingham, Memphis and Oklahoma City.

Our 8,000-mile venture this summer will take us to 10 Major League stadiums in the western United States, a venture that will complement the 20 stadiums we took in last summer from Kansas City eastward.


Of course, baseball is the primary objective, but feasting is a close second. In Birmingham, we visited the oldest professional baseball park in the United States, Rickwood Field. Built in 1910 (two years before Boston's historic Fenway Park), it had been the home of the Black Barons of the Negro League. Today, the field is used for high school tournaments and some annual throwback games.

Of course, no trip to Memphis would be complete without a stop at Graceland where the temperature must have been 1,001 degrees with 99.999 percent humidity. That didn't stop us from dining at two famous rib joints - Interstate BBQ and the

The next day it was onward to Oklahoma City where we checked into an ancient, flea-bitten hotel where I quickly canceled the room and called my administrative assistant (my wife) and requested she find us a more hospitable option. She quickly found us a wonderful Sheraton just minutes away from Bricktown Ballpark, where the Triple A Oklahoma City Redbirds were playing the New Orleans Zephyrs.

Bricktown Ballpark may not have been part of our Major League tour, but it is the real deal. This \$34-million stadium built in 1998 is nicer than half of the big league parks we have seen. Josh said he liked it better than the new \$1.5-billion Yankee

Its classic red brick exterior blends perfectly with neighboring buildings, and the 13,000-seat park provides perfect vantage from every location. We bought Row 4 seats behind home plate for a total of \$26. In the bigs, this would not buy you a third

level obstructed view.

We cheered the home team to a 6-2 victory and took to the road for a night drive to Salina, Kansas, where they must have been having a cow manure convention as every hotel room was filled. So again I called my AA who finally found us a room in a Fairfield Inn just off the interstate.

The next day was a long drive to Denver filled with vast miles of green prairies, dirt roads, hay fields and abandoned farm houses – all the reasons we completely opposed flying. To pass the time, Josh finished two 400-page books.

After 33 hours and 2,100 miles of driving, alas we arrived in Denver.

We started the next day with a brisk two-mile walk to Coors Field for a 10 a.m. tour. Coors Field, located in downtown Denver, was opened in 1995 and was constructed using 1.4 million bricks. Because it is a mile above sea level, the game balls are kept in a humidor to counter the low oxygen level of the high

Coors Field is a top notch facility, but this Florida boy was gasping for breath when we trudged to the third level of the facility. We loved the open concourses that allow you to order food while not missing a pitch. The field is impeccable with rock and water formations in center field and a manual scoreboard in right field that adds a classic touch.

Because it was a night game, we had time in the afternoon to locate a wellknown greasy spoon known as Duffy's where we consumed half-pound burgers smothered with onions, mushrooms, Swiss cheese and bacon along with a large order of Frings - French fries and onion rings. I failed to mention we started the meal with orders of atomic chicken

One hour after the meal, I had to make my first and second visits to the Tums bottle.

But this was far from our only food adventure of the day. Colorado is known for a peculiar dish known as Rocky Mountain Oysters. Perhaps you know their content.

Back at Coors Field for a night game between the Rockies and the Milwaukee Brewers, we abided by our credo to taste the local cuisine. For \$7.50 we ordered a batch from a food vendor who smirked

and stated, "You are he first to order them today." That was not the type of recommendation we were looking for.

Hastily we made our way to our seats along with a beer chaser for me and a coke chaser for Josh.

Verdict? Well, the good news was they were not spherically shaped, rather they were thinly sliced (sounds painful), a bit thicker than potato chips and deep fried.

The bottom line: Rocky Mountain Oysters should not be consumed by humans. They are really bad. They are chewy, strong flavored and smell lousy. We both ate one and then I immediately had Josh take them to a far away garbage can.

Aside from the oysters, we had a great time cheering the Rockies to a 2-0 win over the Brewers. Three cheers for Coors



green, a dog comes running out of one of the houses and grabs your ball and takes off! Now what?

1. This falls into Rule 18-1 "Ball at rest, moved.


2. The rule reads: "If a ball at rest is moved by an outside agency, there is no penalty and the ball must be replaced.


3. What is an outside agency?

4. According to the definitions of the Rules of Golf: In stroke play an outside agency is any agency other than either the competitor's side, any caddy of the side, any ball played by the side at the hole being played or any equipment of the side.

So, the dog is an outside agency and you may replace a ball on the green (Fido isn't giving your ball back) as near as you can figure to where it was and play on with no penalty.





Insurance Tip:

Watch For Your Renewals

After many customers inquired about not receiving a wind renewal over the last month, it was apparent there was a problem larger than too much mail or people moving between

winter and summer homes. Citizens did respond last week that the problem has been fixed. The issue was that some, not all, of wind renewals from mid-April onward had not been mailed. To date no official notification has been given, but informally the cause was given as a systems issue.

Whatever the reason, if your wind policy renews during the next couple of months, watch for your renewal and if you don't receive it, call your agent. The invoices are available online along with the declaration page The agent's first notification that the renewal hasn't been paid is a cancellation notice that comes out on the effective date. There is a 15-day grace period for you to get your payment in, so it is important to open any mail from Citizen, and your agent can help by notifying you about the cancellation notice as well.

Another government insurance issue can affect your insurance coverage. Since the beginning of the year, federal funding for the flood program has not been passed by Congress. There have been two extensions, but as of this date, there is no extension in place, so no new flood insurance can be issued. Home closings with mortgages have been continuing by transferring the active flood policy from the seller to the buyer.

Again, watch your renewals because during this period without an extension of the program and without passage of the flood bill, insurance providers cannot send out your flood renewals. This means that when the funding is passed, all the renewals that are being held up will be released. Flood invoices are sent out a couple of months in advance, which should give you plenty of time to pay your bill. Flood insurance does give you a 30-day grace period after the effective date.

Your insurance agent has been kept informed of what is happening and what options are available, so contact her/him. There are many media stories going on about the ramifications of Congress not approving the flood bill, but your agent gets the latest information directly from FEMA and can give you an accurate

Do All Revocable Trusts **Avoid Probate?**

Then you have a revocable trust, does that always mean that your estate will avoid the probate process when you die? You may be surprised to learn that the answer is

Why is that? First, let's review what the probate process is. Many people think that "probate" means "taxes." Probate is not a tax. Probate is actually a court process where your last will is admitted to court (authenticating that there are no other wills that supplant it), your personal representative is appointed to handle all estate matters (in some states this person is called your "executor"), your creditors are cleared, taxes are paid, accountings are filed, and eventually the beneficiaries receive their inheritance.

While revocable living trusts are designed to avoid the probate process, you actually have to transfer your assets into the trust to make that so. Unfortunately, many people believe that they transferred their assets into their trust when they really haven't. I've found that a common misconception is that

if you create a list of your assets and attach that list to your trust, then you have accomplished a transfer. That won't work.

The correct way to transfer your assets into your trust requires a change on the title to those same assets. Suppose that Ted Turner owns thousands of acres of ranch land in Montana that he wants to put into his revocable trust. He needs to sign a deed that transfers his Montana ranch to the trustee of the trust. Most of the time the person who creates the trust is also acts as his or her own trustee. So the deed in this example would likely be to Ted Turner, Trustee for the Ted Turner Revocable Trust dated July 1, 2010 (assuming that is the day that Ted signed his revocable trust).

The same holds true with Ted's certificate of deposits, bank accounts and brokerage accounts. He needs to complete forms with his financial institutions that change the name on the account to Ted Turner, Trustee for the Ted Turner Trust. If he or his lawyer does not go through this exercise, then Ted hasn't transferred his assets into his trust, and those same assets will therefore have to go through the probate process on his death.

Your wealth needn't rise to the level of Ted Turner's by the way, to benefit from a revocable trust. If your net worth exceeds \$250,000 then you should take the time to consider whether a revocable trust is right for you. This depends largely not only on the value of your net worth, but on the types of assets that you own, and the facts of your individual and family

Many people worry that once they transfer their assets into their revocable living trust, then they'll lose control over those assets. This simply isn't true. Since by definition the grantor of a revocable living trust can amend or revoke the trust at any time, he or she controls the trust and the trust assets as long as they are alive and competent. Generally speaking, the grantor of a revocable living trust can consume, sell and transfer any asset at any time without restriction.

It is not uncommon for people who have revocable living trusts to die with assets outside of the trust requiring a probate. This isn't the end of the world. When you have a revocable living trust, your will becomes something known as a "pour over will." If you read the provisions of your pour over will carefully, you'll see that your will doesn't really say who is to get what from your estate.

Instead, you'll find that the will directs distribution of those probate assets into your revocable living trust. Your will acts as a "safety net," catching the assets that should have been transferred into your revocable living trust during your lifetime transferring them at your passing into your trust.

This highlights another benefit of revocable trusts. Note that the pour over will doesn't say who gets what from your estate – and how they get it. It simply

says to transfer any probate assets into your trust for distribution in accordance with its terms. All wills are public documents since they have been filed with probate court. Ányone can go down to the courthouse and see your will after your death. In contrast, trusts are private documents. They are not filed publicly. So even if you have assets subject to probate at your death, if you have a trust the general public will not be able to easily see who your beneficiaries are and what they are receiving. In today's world filled with scam artists, this is a rather important benefit to trusts.

There are certain assets that should not be transferred into your revocable living trust during your lifetime. If you were to try to transfer your IRA account, for example, you would likely have to recognize all of the taxable income inherent within the IRA. Since IRAs name a beneficiary they do not go through the probate process at your death and therefore do not - and should not - be transferred into your revocable living trust. Generally speaking, annuities also are not funded into revocable trusts for much the same

If you are wondering whether the right assets have been properly transferred to your trust, you should visit with your estate planning attorney to review your current situation. Provide copies of your current deeds, brokerage, bank, and financial statements and copies of any annuity, life insurance and IRA accounts along with their beneficiary designations.



The Goods On Grapefruit And Medications

Pharmacist: My medication label suddenly warns not to eat grapefruit, but is this a serious interaction? Reason I ask is because I love to eat it, and nothing has

happened to me so far.

KA, Tulsa, Oklahoma

Then stay consistent with your eating habits because consistency allows your doctor to adjust medication dose based on eating habits. Momentarily, I'll tell how this incredible fruit can help you lower cholesterol, burn fat and reduce cancer risk, but first I must warn you that grapefruit prevents proper breakdown of some medications, causing blood levels to spike. This may happen even if you separate administration of the drug from the fruit or the juice by days.

Soon enough, I will give you a list of drugs to avoid if you won't give up the grapefruit. I wouldn't blame you either; I love grapefruit myself. The seeds are the primary source of naringenin, which is the bitter chemical that causes the pucker. It's also a strong antioxidant that not only

neutralizes free-radicals (which promote cancer) but also seems to prevent hardening of the arteries.

Grapefruit may boost metabolism, at least in rodents. Thin rats don't necessarily translate to thin thighs, although I still think grapefruit is a fine edition to most diet plans, especially those that include ways to help you improve progesterone to estrogen ratio and increase thyroid hormone. Grapefruit may help people with diabetes or metabolic syndrome (high cholesterol, blood pressure and blood sugar). Naringenin is not an appetite suppressant, or a fat blocker so if you take those dietary supplements, it's also fine to take this bioflavonoid supplement. It can be combined with protein supplements too, which are often recommended during weight loss.


You'll see it listed in various ways, including naringenin, grapefruit seed extract, GSE or part of a comprehensive bioflavonoid formula that also contains hesperidin, rutin or quercetin. These types of products are widely available at health food stores. Before you get too excited and buy supplements or fresh fruit at the grocery store, I need you to promise me that you'll get both your physician and pharmacist's approval (and it wouldn't hurt to research yourself) to find out if grapefruit, or grapefruit-containing supplements are right for you.

The approval from both your doctor and pharmacist is important because I don't have the space to list all of the drugs that might potentially interact. The following drugs (and possibly related

Got A Problem? Dr. Connie Is In

Q: Can you tell me what causes depression in someone? I feel that my father suffers from it and I would like to help him, but I am not sure how to go about it.

A: Depression can be caused by chemical imbalances in the brain and there is also evidence that a trauma, childhood abuse, and certain illnesses can predispose one to depression later in life.

There has been widespread debate over the best way to diagnose and treat this illness. Research has shown that for severe depression, anti-depressants do help, however, for mild to moderate depression, they are not as effective.

Others do debate this issue as antidepressants' effectiveness may not be evidenced in studies as one patient may find it effective and another may not. Physicians may try several different medications and have to experiment before a particular one is effective. There is also the timeline that varies. Anti-depressants can take up to a month to six weeks to show any effectiveness. There is really no way to know in advance which medication is likely to help.

If your father has physical complaints, the underlying cause may be depression as it often shows up in older adults as physical ailments. When the depression is treated, the physical complaints improve.

If your father is having difficulty completing daily tasks, he should be seen by a physician. A variety of psychotherapeutic approaches are also helpful. The important thing to know is that depression is treatable.

Research has shown for years that the combination of psychotherapy and antidepressant medication can have long lasting results, reducing the risk that depression will return.

So talk with your father and let him know that you are concerned for his well-being and perhaps if he is suffering from the symptoms of depression that he should see his doctor and then be there to support him on the next best steps to







Nursing School Approved At Edison College

he Edison State College Board of Trustees unanimously approved the School of Nursing within the college. The new school provides students and faculty a greater sense of camaraderie and also provides more visibility and oversight for the variety of nursing programs at ESC.

Programs offered include:

- Associate Degree Nursing (RN) enrollment for fall is expected to be more than 500 students
- Advanced Placement Nursing (LPN to RN) - Current enrollment is 60 students and 60 new students will begin in
- RN to BSN (Baccalaureate completion degree program) - Current enrollment is 130 students and the school expects to add 70-100 in the fall.

 Certified Nursing Assistant -Certificate training program.

'This new organizational structure positions the college to continue to develop the baccalaureate mission," said Dr. Mary Lewis, director of nursing.

Edison State nursing students remain

above the state and national averages consistently (Edison 93 percent, state 88 percent) on the state licensure exam. Edison State College has consistently ranked 13-15 percent in the number of nursing graduates in the country for community and state colleges, and student interest in pursuing the nursing profession continues to grow.

In 2008, 248 students graduated from the program, 260 students in 2009, and it is anticipated that Edison will graduate over 300 nurses in 2010. In addition, student enrollment for the Nursing Associates degree will surpass 650 students in 2011 and more than 200 students in the RN to BSN program.

In July 2010, a new 58,000 square foot nursing annex will be completed. This addition will consist of a large auditorium and medical museum on the first floor and a simulation hospital on the second floor. The implementation of simulation on this large scale offers opportunity for instructional design changes. These changes will offer interdisciplinary training opportunities and hospital employee integration for clinical and documentation

The Nursing program is accredited by the NLNAC (National League of Nursing Accrediting Commission).

I laid my head on the pillow that night, no longer concerned about my house disintegrating into sawdust but rather plagued with visions of herds of hungry tarantulas burrowing under my silk sheets in search of something tastier than antchops.

It didn't help when I recalled the fact that the average North American will ingest, while sleeping, three spiders in their lifetime.  "Looks like a fresh spider bite Bloggins. In fact, so fresh that the beast could be on you right now." At this point a horrified Bloggins usually begins the dance of spider evasion, frantically patting his clothes and hair as he undresses as if his shorts were on fire.

"Will I die?" he pants.

"Yes, one day. But nobody has died of a spider bite in 10 years in North America. So relax. If you were a child and were covered in black widow bites then you might have some serious problems requiring antivenim, otherwise just wash the wound well and slap some meat tenderizer on that bite to neutralize the protein."

Bees Wasps, Hornets, Yellow Jackets

When Betty Bee is disturbed while cross pollinating her daisies she might get upset and set her stinger deep into your skin. But she has a barb attached to her stinger that prevents her from pulling it out of her victim. When she attempts to fly away, the barbed stinger is anchored so solidly to the stingee that it tears Betty Bee's belly, eviscerating and mortally wounding her. This is why if you listen closely while being stung you will hear "BzzzzOHCRAPbzzz." Too bad bee, or not to bee. Wasps on the other hand have no barbs and enjoy stinging you several times.

If stung by a bee, carefully scrape off the stinger with a knife or credit card (cost of stingerless sting: priceless). Throw some meat tenderizer and some ice on it. You might also use baking soda and even an aluminum-based deodorant (for perspiration-free bites).

A localized swelling at the site of a sting does not mean allergy. But if each sting leads to more intense local reactions, allergies may develop. If a serious allergic reaction occurs it will likely do so within 20 minutes. Eyes and skin will itch, vomiting and labored breathing usually follows. If allergic, carry a dual injection emergency allergy kit at all times or you might be providing the bees with... more daisies.
